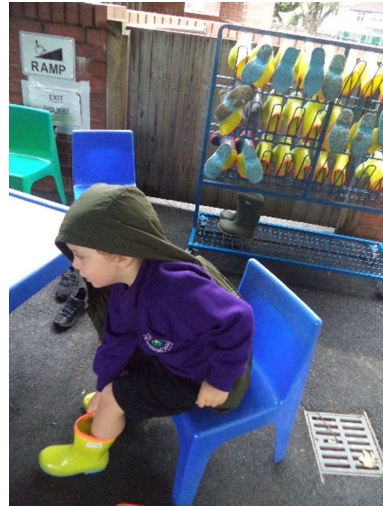
How can my family help me to get ready for Nursery?

Developing Independence: Encourage your child to have a go!

- Support your child in getting to the toilet in time, wiping themselves, flushing the toilet and washing their hands. Sometimes children are so involved in play that accidents do happen. Please talk to your child about what to do if an accident occurs, encouraging them to ask an adult for help. Please provide a spare change of clothes in case accidents do happen.



- Develop self-help skills by encouraging your child to take off and put on their own jumper and coat. Support your child in doing up zips, buttons and poppers; we understand that these can be tricky so make it fun by dressing up toys in old clothes. Encourage your child to take their shoes and socks on and off by themselves. Don't wait until the first day - give them time to practise.

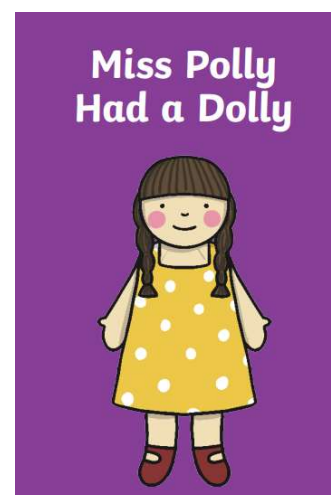
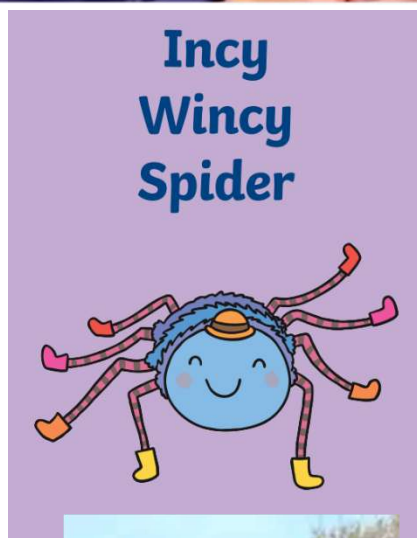
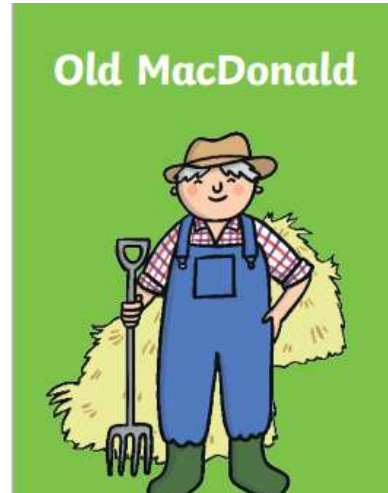


Help your child to communicate with others.

- Talk to your child without distractions from your mobile phone, the TV, radio or tablet. Talk about shared experiences that you have enjoyed such as visits, shopping trips, or things you have seen.



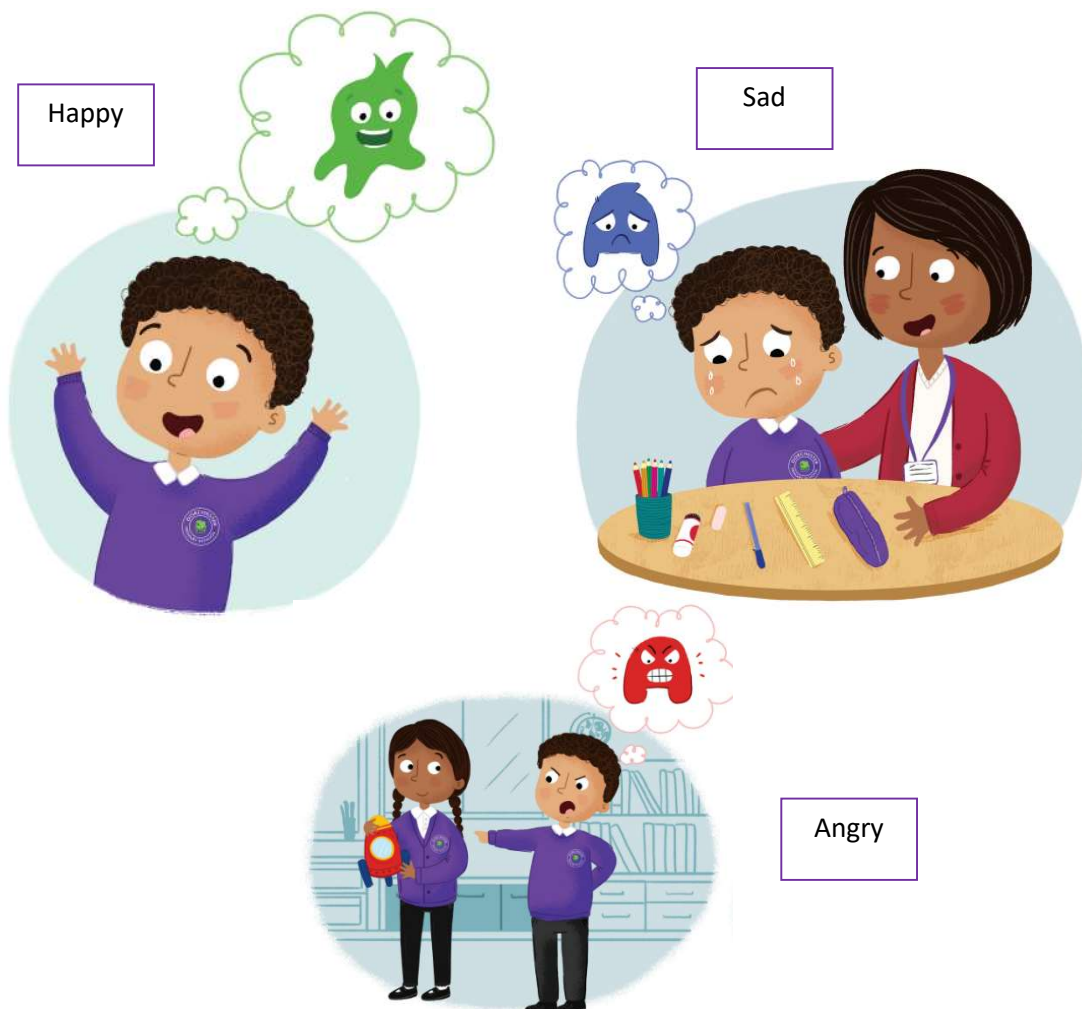
- Sing songs and nursery rhymes together these will help to develop their vocabulary. You will find some of our favourite nursery rhymes in this pack.



- Share stories with your child daily to help to enhance their vocabulary and love of reading. Encourage your child to turn the pages, talk about the pictures and join in with repeated refrains.



- Recognise and talk through your child's feelings and different emotions, this will help them to understand and communicate how they are feeling with staff.



- Where possible, encourage your child to play with other children taking turns and sharing resources. These are essential skills for when your child starts Nursery.
- You can also play turn taking games to help your child to understand that sometimes they have to wait for their turn and share with others.



Help your child to feel secure in their new environment.

- Talk to your child about the Nursery environment and staff. You may like to share these photographs with them to help them to become familiar with our faces. Please remember that in Nursery the children call the staff by their first names. Reassure your child that you will return each day to collect them!

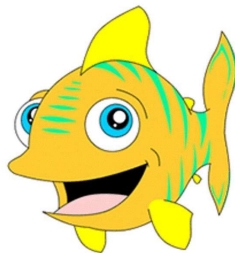
Incy Wincy Spider
