Dear Parents,

It has been lovely to enjoy the sunshine this week, coupled with a shorter week for all of us, and additional day's break for Polling Day for some of us, and lots of exciting opportunities for our children in between.

Of course one of the problems some families face in summer is convincing children that it is indeed bed time when it is still light outside. Research tells us that sleep plays a crucial role in the development of young minds, having a positive impact on happiness, alertness and attention, cognitive performance, mood, resilience, learning and memory and even the ability to acquire a wider vocabulary, so it is important that we aim to keep children's bedtimes regular whatever the season. Here are some hints and tips that might help:

- 1) Keep bedtime consistent if you want them to have a 7pm bedtime, put them to bed at 7pm their body clocks will quickly become used to it and they will become tired at 7pm.
- 2) If you are making their bedtime earlier, move it back in stages 5 minutes earlier each day for example, until they reach your target bedtime comfortably.
- 3) Keep bedtime and daylight unconnected. Avoid phrases like 'it's dark now...it must be time for bed'.
- 4) Serve dinner early: If you eat dinner at 5pm and then let them play a bit, take a long bath, and read books in time for their 7pm bedtime, it feels a lot later to them than if you follow up a 6:30 dinner with an immediate bedtime.
- 5) Use black out curtains, or sew black fabric on the back of your curtains.
- 6) Teach children to stay in their rooms even if they wake up this helps them to understand that bedtime hours are set hours they have nothing to do with whether they are awake or sleeping, tired or awake or whether it's light or dark outside.

Going against all of the above, our Year 3 and 4 children had a ball at their school sleepover last Friday. It was, as expected, slightly misnamed as there was not too much sleeping done by many excited children, although we also had a few impressive sleep lovers who managed a solid 10 hours even on a hall floor — one of them told me that their mum tells them that she thinks they could sleep in the middle of Piccadilly Circus — now we have evidence she is right! A huge thank you to the very tired staff team who certainly earned their Bank Holiday on Monday and thank you so much for all your positive feedback about the event — and, of course, for picking up on time!



A huge thank you to Mrs Cucharo and the office team for all their help in organising the event, and to Mrs Wyman for her work with the choir alongside Mrs Cucharo and for accompanying the children on the night.









Junior Duke Awards


Junior Duke Awards

how to MAKE ECOBRICKS





Eco-Council at Dorchester Primary are starting an exciting project. We would like to encourage every member of the Dorchester community to make their own Ecobricks. We will be using these bricks to build a greenhouse in our Forest School area.

How to make an Ecobrick

- Collect all your UNRECYCLABLE plastic. The
 plastic that can't go in your recycling collection
 or be taken to be recycled in store.
 For example: straws and pasta packets.
 Look for the label that says Not Yet Recycled.
- 2. CLEAN and DRY your plastic.
- Find a large drinks bottle. Clean and dry out the bottle by leaving the lid off. (Keep the lid) Take the label off and put this inside the bottle.
- 4. Cut any large pieces up. Stuff the plastic inside the bottle.
- Fill the bottle-up with your plastic and squash down inside the bottle using a long stick or wooden spoon.
- Only once there is no spaces left and you fit no more plastic in screw the lid on very tight.
- 7. Your Ecobrick is ready for the test. Can you stand on the Ecobrick on its side? If the brick takes your weight, then it is ready to use.

THERE SHOULD BE NO FOOD OR LIQUID INSIDE THESE BOTTLES. EVERYTHING SHOULD BE CLEAN AND DRY.

If you could have a superpower what power would you have? How would you use your power to help other people?



This week in Nursery, we read the story of Superkid by Claire Freedman and Sarah McIntyre. Superkid is an ordinary child who looks like everyone else. However, when he sees a child that needs help he turns into Superkid and helps them. We have been thinking about how we can help each other. We have also been thinking about other people who help us in our school community. The highlight of our week was when Yippy came to visit and told us all about her job as a Lollipop Lady. We learnt that Yippy is there to help all the children cross the road every day! The children learnt how to cross the road safely and we learnt all about how Yippy's uniform and lollipop help to keep her safe on the road. The children asked Yippy lots of questions and they were very excited when they found out that men can be Lollipop People too. The children each had a turn at holding Yippy's lollipop stick and we were surprised to find out how heavy it is. The children have all created puppets to turn themselves into superheroes and we have been making our own Superhero stories. For our Maths learning we have been exploring the properties of shapes.

Who would you like to go on a boat trip with and why?



This week the children in Reception have been reading Mr Gumpy's Outing by John Burningham. Mr Gumpy is joined on his boat trip down the river by some children and some excitable animals who cause the journey to have a rather lively outcome! We have used this story to recreate a boat trip in our Maths learning this week. We have been using the term 'First, Then and Now' when we are doing addition sentences - for example: first 2 rabbits got on the boat, then 3 children, now there are 5 characters on the boat. We have also been using our phonic knowledge to write about which animals or children are joining us on our own boats. The children were only in for three days this week but have managed to complete a lot of activities.



Class Notes

Where does Paddington come from?



In year 1, the children really enjoyed the workshop on Hinduism and learnt lots of useful facts. The children have looked at different artefacts and written describing sentences about them.

In Literacy, we have introduced our new story 'Paddington Bear' and the children have spent time acting out the story. They enjoyed writing questions to ask the characters from the story and taking on the role of the character.

In Maths, we have looked at length and measuring a range of objects. The children enjoyed putting the objects in length order and using cubes to measure them.

In PSHE, we have looked at how we can keep safe and important rules to follow. The children thought about why the rules were important and other ways they could stay safe.

What interesting facts do you know about your extended family?



In English in year 2, we have been learning about newspaper reports, identifying their features and the language used. We have also been researching facts on the fire of London to use when writing our own newspaper reports about the fire.

In Maths, we have been recapping multiplication, division and finding fractions of shape and number.

In PSHE we have learnt about family trees and the children have had a go at making their own.

At National Online Safety, our mission is to make the internet a safer place for children by equipping school staff, parents and children with the knowledge they need to understand online dangers.

This week in Year 5, we have been continuing to learn about decimals and fractions in Maths, thinking carefully about ordering and rounding. In Literacy, we completed our Peppered Moth Fact Files as part of our Star Write. We were concentrating on formal tone, scientific language and formal fronted adverbials.

In PSHE, we learnt about edited photographs and how easy it is to use apps to alter images. We spoke about how dangerous this can be and how we should always be mindful that not everything we see on the Internet is true. In the same lesson, we looked at fake news and how to spot false news articles.

We are so excited to be going on the residential next week, and the children staying in school also have really exciting things to look forward to!

We are really proud of the way the children have tackled this week. Their resilience, perseverance and humour are a credit to them. Much of our time has been spent making final preparations for SATs next week and the children have risen to the challenge and coped brilliantly with all the practice. They have also attended an extra revision day on Thursday, where they have been in very small groups, with 2 or 3 teachers per group, to really give them a final boost. As part of this day, they also started to learn some songs for our end of year production, 'Peter Pan', which they have enjoyed immensely! - Thank you to Mrs Cucharo and her team, for inspiring them! The sound of their enthusiastic singing proved how much they are enjoying the songs. It's also a reminder of just how valuable singing is in terms of mental health.




Supporting our children's safety ONLINE SAFETY

Welcome to Digital Matters

The Digital Matters platform uses free interactive lessons and dynamic storytelling to help teachers engage young people in online safety lessons.

Following UKCIS' Education for a Connected World Framework and created by Internet Matters, Digital Matters covers a range of online safety lesson topics ranging from cyberbullying to fake news to password security and more. It engages children through quizstyle and story-based learning while promoting discussion in the classroom to promote a safer internet.



How it works

The platform is divided into two sections: Interactive Learning and Once Upon Online.

Students start with Interactive Learning, led by their teacher, where they learn about the e-safety concept through small activities and discussion.

Next, they go onto Once Upon Online, either in the classroom or with support at home, and guide the character through choices using what they learnt. The story lets children make realistic choices in a safe environment to better understand the consequences of such choices along with what can be done if they find themselves in a situation like the characters so they can stay safe online.

At school and at home

Teachers who have an account can download free lesson plans about online safety and supporting materials for each lesson. These resources help teachers guide students through both the Interactive Learning and Once Upon Online sections. As a part of the lessons, there is a take home component to encourage parents to engage with their child's internet safety education as well.

Parents can access the app on their own with access to a special Parent Companion Guide. This guide provides a little more information about the app and the topic to ensure they can support their child online. They can then go through both sections with their child or choose to complete the Once Upon Online section with different answers for different results. Digital Matters opens discussion about choices made online and how children can find support if they need it.


