We raised money this time round, for the fantastic local charity Sutton Night Watch, as voted for by school council. This local charity focusses on supporting those who are homeless in Sutton. School council shared the great work of Sutton Night watch in assembly that day, and chose specifically to start by selecting a local charity. Next, school council will be looking to support a national charity, then afterwards an international charity as a way of trying to think increasingly globally after starting from supporting those right on our doorstep.



How is Diwali celebrated?

In Nursery this week we have read the story 'Lighting a Lamp' by Jonny Zucker. The children have found out about lots of different ways that Diwali is celebrated. They have enjoyed using salt dough to shape their own Diva lamps, and they have decorated them with lots of colour and sparkles. They have also been looking at different Mehndi patterns that people use to decorate their hands for Diwali. They were all really excited when they were able to use face paints to draw their own Mehndi patterns on to their hands. We have also been looking at different Rangoli patterns and tried to create some using different methods.

What can you remember about Diwali?

In Reception, children have been learning about two Celebrations that will take pace this week. One is Diwali, the Hindu festival that starts on Thursday. The children have been making Rangoli patterns using a variety of materials such as chalk, rice and felt pens, both inside and out. They have heard the story of Sita and Rama and learned that the word Diwali means 'festival of light'. They have made diva lamps using clay, that will be decorated next week. The second celebration is Fireworks night which falls on Friday. The children have talked about keeping themselves safe when around bonfires or fireworks. As can be seen on Instagram this week, they have used paints and salad spinners to create colourful firework pictures and they have been writing the letters of their names on fluorescent post-it notes to stick on rockets which are flying around our classrooms.

In maths we have been learning about the numbers 1, 2 and 3. We have been matching images and grouping items to make the numbers. In Phonics the children have been revising all the sounds they learnt in the first half-term and have been continuing to blend them to read words. Lots of exciting activities and learning as always.

What fire safety rules did Firefighter Fred tell you?

The children have had a great first week back and have been extremely busy. They have enjoyed spending time with their friends and getting back into the routine of school.

In Literacy, we have introduced our new topic 'Rumble in the Jungle' and have been using the book written by Giles Andreae and David Wojtowycz to help us find out what animals live there and how they behave. The children have enjoyed acting out the story, writing questions to the lion and then having a lion come to visit them, so they could ask their questions.

This week in Maths, we have been using the part, part whole model to help the children understand how to partition numbers. The children have selected their own numbers and then used objects to investigate how they could make the whole number.

In Geography, we have been looking at jungles and where in the world they are located. We will be using maps to help us understand the different continents and countries of the world are found.

As today is 'Bonfire Night' we have looked at fire safety and how and why bonfire night is celebrated. We read a story from Firefighter Fred who told us some important safety rules to remember.

- 1 Where gloves when holding a sparkler.
- 2 Stand still when holding a sparkler.
- 3 Put the sparkler in water when it is finished.
- 4 Only grown-ups should light fireworks.
- 5 Don't stand too close to a bonfire.
- 6 Walk and hold your grown up hands when near a bonfire.



What are the features of a letter?

Year 2 have been very excited to start their new geography topic 'Eager Explorers'. This term we will be looking at maps and their features and learning how to use them.

In English we have been looking at the Jolly Postman and completed a mission for him. We had to deliver letters to fairytale characters and at each house we were given a task or a game to play. We then looked at the features of the letters and the different sentence types that were used.


In maths we have begun using money and making different amounts using coins and notes.

What did you enjoy most about our new book Escape to Pompeii?

This week, we have started our new book called 'Escape from Pompeii' and have explored the language used. We have also applied this new knowledge by using powerful verbs and fronted adverbials to help us write our own sentences about the eruption of Vesuvius. In Geography, we continued with this theme and used Google Maps and Google Earth to locate volcanoes from all around the world. We noticed that most of the volcanoes lay along the edges of the tectonic plates! In Science, we have been learning about the water cycle as part of our 'States of matter' topic. We learned about evaporation, condensation and precipitation. In Maths, we have been finishing our addition and subtraction unit and have been using our new skills to help us solve a range of word problems. In PSHE, we have learned about the word discrimination, what it means to discriminate against someone and why it is wrong. We also covered this in our picture news assembly this week too!

What is the most interesting fact you have learned about the Titanic this week?

This week we have started our new book all about life on the Titanic and have begun planning and will eventually be writing diary entries as characters who once boarded the great but doomed vessel. In Maths, we have been starting to revise factors and multiples; times tables knowledge is key here so we encourage all pupils, parents carers and family members to get practising morning, noon and night! Any opportunity to practise timestables will help immensely with this terms mathematics, which will be focusing on multiplication and division. In Science, we have been learning about reversible and irreversible changes. Test your own scientific knowledge now!



What else was happening in the world, when the Maya existed ?

This week, we began to study the book, 'A series of Unfortunate events,' which the children are very excited about as many of them have either read the first book or have watched the film or both. They are enjoying exploring a mostly familiar text, and then using it as a basis for practising reading comprehension questions and also writing brilliantly descriptive texts. We are fortunate enough to have one copy of the book per child, which is lovely for them, as they can follow along as it is read to them and then refer to the text in their work. In Maths, we have been continuing with our Fractions unit of work and learning how to multiply and divide fractions. The children were quite relieved to find it is slightly easier than adding and subtracting fractions. Our DT links our Autumn 1 Brazil topic and our Autumn 2 Maya topic. The children have begun to explore the 'Rainforest Cafe' website and are looking forward to recreating their own version in a shoebox later on this term, as well as incorporating Food Technology and making their own empanadas!



Supporting our children's safety

Parents and carers often appreciate extra advice and support. This might be about how to cope with a crying baby; working out whether a child is old enough to walk home from school alone; or thinking about how to keep their child safe online. Road Safety

Top tips for keeping children safe near roads:

- Children under 8 should always hold a grown up's hand when walking near roads
- Children under 8 should always cross roads with a grown up, at a safe crossing place
- Until they are 150cm tall, all children should sit in a correctly sized and fitted child seat when travelling by car
- Children under 10 should not cycle on roads, they should keep to cycle paths away from motorised traffic
- Children should always wear a helmet when cycling to protect their head if they fall off

The number of road accidents increase during this period so we urge everyone to think about what they are wearing.
