What is your favourite part of preparing for Christmas?

We got impatient waiting for the real thing, so the children in Nursery have enjoyed making their own snow to play in. It is incredible what you can do with a bit of hair conditioner and some cornflour! The children had a lovely time exploring the textures and making their own snow scenes. They were also very good at explaining the changes that they saw in the ingredients whilst it was being made. The children have been busy decorating our tree each day and making their own Christmas decorations. They have been developing their fine motor skills by cutting their own strips of paper to make paper chains. They have also been able to use their maths knowledge to make repeating patterns on baubles. We have enjoyed sharing the story 'Twas the night before Christmas' and the children have all enjoyed talking about how they prepare for Christmas at home. At the beginning of the week we were very proud of all the children as they performed 'Our First Nativity' to their families. They all remembered the signs and words to all the songs and danced with confidence, gifting their families with memories to last a lifetime.

Well Wow Reception! What a start to the week! On Tuesday, both classes took part in two Nativity performances in front of their parents and other family members. The children were amazing! We are so proud of them.

This week the children have been learning about two different celebrations. One is the festival of St Nicholas, which is celebrated in many European Countries and also by people from those Countries, who live here. The children took part in the custom of cleaning a shoe and leaving it out by the door. They were very lucky because St Nicholas visited us and left a clementine and a chocolate coin for everyone.



Class Notes

What happens in Winter?

The children have had another busy week in Year 1 and have all been working very hard. Thank you to everyone who attended the Phonics workshop on Thursday. If you were unable to attend but would like to watch it, it will be downloaded into your child's google classroom by Monday.

In English, the children have completed their star writes (children's independent writing) and have worked incredibly hard to remember everything they have learnt. For their star write they had to retell the story of 'The Monkey Puzzle' and they did a fantastic job.

In Maths, we have been looking at subtraction and how we can use a part whole model to help us find the answer. The children have thought about the different words they can use for subtractions and how they can use objects to help them work out the answers.

In Science, we have looked at the four seasons and the changes we have noticed as we prepare for Winter. The children enjoyed looking at the different clothes and sorting them into the different seasons.

In Geography, we looked at the impact humans are having on the jungle and what we could do to help save the jungle. We looked at how it was affecting the animals that live there, the children spent time creating their own save the Orangutan posters.

What new facts have you learnt about penguins?

Year 2 have been working really hard practising our Nativity and can't wait to show their parents and carers next week!

This week we have also been writing non-chronological reports. The children have researched their own facts about penguins on the chromebooks and created fact files of what they found. They then used these to plan and write their own reports.

In Maths they have impressed our with their division skills and they are beginning to divide by 2 and 5. They are also starting to recognise the relationship between multiplication and division.

In Science we have been investigating which materials change through using forces and in Geography we have learnt compass directions.

Are robot teachers better than humans?

We have had a very exciting week in Year 3 and 4 this week. In English we have been writing a balanced argument about whether teachers should be replaced by Robots. Most of us decided that teachers are better than robots for many reasons, including the fact that robots can't laugh at all our bad jokes. This was a really great thing to be discussing because for the past few weeks one member of our year group has been able to join our lessons through their own robot called Astro. In Maths we have been continuing with our multiplication and division and learning more about how they are connected to each other. In RE we thought about how the different characters from the Christmas story would have felt. In Art we recreated our Pop Art volcanoes using collage, and we built spaghetti buildings to see the effects of Earthquakes on buildings and communities in Geography. We have learned so much, as well as having lots of fun.









Supporting our children's safety

Christmas is such a wonderful time of year, excitable children and time to relax with family and friends. And of course, there are new toys to play with. With a huge increase in sales of devices (around 13 million people receive smartphones for Christmas each year) it is important to ensure that you and your children are safe when playing with new kit. To help, we've set out a few top tips to help keep your household safe online over the holidays.

The Tech: Learn your way around - Most devices have controls to ensure that kids can't access content you don't want them to. Make sure your "in-app" purchases are disabled to avoid a nightmare surprise in the new year.

Tablets - Tablets are really popular with younger children, and the market has several which are geared towards child friendly content. When it comes to using them, start slowly; only download games and apps you have checked out carefully (sites such as www.net-aware.org.uk, or www.commonsensemedia.org provide useful advice!) and steer them towards age targeted content such as www.bbc.co.uk/iplayer/cbeebies/features/iplayer-kids or YouTube Kids.

Mobile devices - If you have older children, and are thinking about getting them a new phone for Christmas, this can pose its own challenges:

The old online safety message about having your home computer in a communal place becomes defunct, because phones are literally mobile computers and have the power of most traditional desktop PCs.

Set boundaries - Our advice is to set some ground rules, and ensure they understand them. For example:

Screen Time - Agree a time limit or number of games beforehand, to avoid repeated disagreements around how long they can spend online.

Sleep comes first - It is advisable that the phone stays out of the bedroom to avoid those night time interruptions.

Ask for access - If you're genuinely concerned about them, ask them to allow you access to the phone.

Monitoring vs having a conversation

It is possible to install software onto devices that monitors online activity, alerts you to inappropriate behaviour, and can block access to certain content. This type of software is becoming increasingly popular, but while this might sound tempting, it does pose a number of issues around your child's right to privacy & could have an impact upon your relationship with them. SWGFL published this blog earlier this year, which covers the subject in some detail and raises some interesting points. The best advice we can give is to talk to your child regularly and openly about behaviour and risk, so that they know they can come to you if something goes wrong. SWGFL also covered this in its Parenting in a Digital Age series earlier this year, in this blog.

Consider setting parental controls on your Wi-Fi – you can block access to inappropriate or adult content, and set time limits which may help rein in those excessive Minecraft sessions. The UK Safer Internet Centre has advice on this here.

Gaming

Finally, a word about games. This year there are so many exciting games and consoles around, there is a good chance you might have one in your house. Whether a DS, Nintendo Switch or PS4, there is something for everyone, and every age. Consider whether your child is mature enough to join an online community, and whether the games they are playing are appropriate. For more advice on this visit www.askaboutgames.com. Our blog from earlier this year, (The real cost of online gaming/ also gives an insight into the type of things to be aware of when it comes to gaming.

Finally, make sure you enjoy your tech together, it's the perfect time of year!
