Dorchester Primary School's Coronation Celebration Friday 5th May 2023

The coronation of the new Sovereign is an occasion for celebration that has remained essentially the same over a thousand years. All of the Dorchester community can be part of this exciting time in history, and here is what we have got planned:

Mufti day Friday 5th May!

Red, white and blue mufti day for all OR come dressed as your favourite royal or monarch for the day!



9.05am – Whole School Coronation assembly delivered by School Parliament on the history of the coronation (school parliament members' parents/carers invited to watch)

9.45am – Coronation plate design competition in class (some classes may complete earlier in the week to better fit their timetables)

'For King and Crockery!" Commemorative coronation plate design competition



Children will all have the chance to design their very own commemorative coronation plate. The designs will be created on paper plates in class all together. Children may prepare an initial design at home if they wish and bring this in to then help with their final design in class. (circular dimensions/template will be shared via classlist for pupils who wish to print and prepare their designs before hand at home)

Pupils will vote in class for their class' winning design, then these go through to a final vote by school parliament later on.

Two winning designs (KS1 and KS2) will eventually be selected, photographed and sent to be printed onto real ceramic plates - one for the winning children's families and one for the school to display.

Everyone will be able to take their paper plate design home, and if families choose to do so, may order their own commemorative ceramic plate from their children's own plate design.

Various other fun coronation themed activities will be taking place in classes until the afternoon's celebration picnic.

All children's parents/carers are invited to join in the afternoon tea!

Class reps and teachers will work together in the lead up next week to plan and organise who is bringing what for each classes' afternoon tea contributions.

They will use a list provided for families to tick off from to ensure a range of sharing plates can be prepared for all classes. Tick lists will be shared with all classes next week.

Parents and carers may bring additional food and drinks for themselves too if they wish so they may also take part in the tea with the children as the sharing plates will be predominantly for the children in each class to share.

All pupils will have already had their proper lunch during their lunch break prior to the afternoon tea.

1.30pm – Afternoon tea setup

Parent reps and volunteers, teaching staff and prefects will help to setup the year group afternoon tea areas.

The field behind the school will be demarcated for year groups. Map and aerial view of year group areas will be sent out in advance to ensure everyone knows where they are going.

2pm – Coronation Afternoon Tea on the field. Each class will have their own designated area on the field behind the school.

Families of more than one child may have children moving between year group areas but to ensure they inform their teachers if doing so.

Nursery and Reception classes will be able to take part only if enough parent/carer volunteers are able to come and help walk them there and back from 2pm - 3pm. So please get volunteering!

2.30pm – Choir to sing commemorative coronation song and then everyone to sing national anthem, followed by some party games for classes to take part in.

2.50pm - Afternoon tea tidy up


3pm - All pupils to return to their classrooms with their teacher for normal end of day dismissal time.

What are the different ways that Eid is celebrated?

In Nursery this week we have been learning all about Eid and how it is celebrated. Some of our children who celebrated Eid have shared photographs of their celebrations and confidently talked to the class about some of the special things that they did to celebrate. The children have learnt key facts about Eid and Ramadan and understand that lots of Muslims can only eat before sunrise or after sunset when they are fasting. We also learnt that Muslim's pray 5 times a day on their prayer mats. We have linked this to our maths learning and revisited how to count to 5 and how the number 5 is written. The children also enjoyed finding 5 special things in the classroom. The children have also been very creative and made their own Eid cards and prayer mats.

Where have the Gingerbread Man been seen this week?

What an adventurous we have had in Reception this week. We have been reading the story of The Gingerbread Man. And so the refrain 'Run, run, as fast as you can. You can't catch me, I'm the Gingerbread Man!" has been heard frequently around the building. On Monday we all made our own Gingerbread biscuits, each class making an extra large one for Mrs Hall and Mrs Bell. Before we got to see the biscuits, the children were told that the two big ones had run away and nobody knew where they had gone. Everyone. got to work immediately making Missing posters to go around the school so that, if they were found, they could be brought back to the classrooms. The children also set about creating traps, in case the Gingerbread men came back to the classroom while the children were at home. Then we were sent some pictures by people who had seen the Gingerbread Men running out of school and down the High Street Worcester Park. They were even caught having a swing in the park. We printed off the photos and the children wrote about what they could see. We have continued to learn about numbers that are bigger than 10 and investigated the pattern of numbers as we count

What are the stages of a human life cycle?

This week in English, we have written some wonderful descriptions about the Great Fire of London, using Sammy the Street Dog as a text to give us ideas. The children wrote about 'huge, bright red flames', 'raging fires' and 'swirling, thick, black smoke'. In History, we looked in more detail about London's buildings in 1666, and talked about what had changed to them after they were rebuilt. In Maths, the children have been doing lots of practice in telling the time, and have described analogue time up to intervals of 5s, to count around the clock. We have also been describing positions and directions of movement. In Science this week, we investigated how humans change as they grow into adults, looking at the different key stages. In Art, the children have begun to look at how textures can be made with different painting tools. In PSHE, we looked at family roles and how different members of a family might care for one another. In Computing we have used Scratch Jr on the iPads to program a sprite, seeing all the different ways we can make it interact.



What features in your writing for Oliver Twist will enhance the description?

This week in Year 5 we have been continuing with our work on practising using speech and narrative in a fine balance with one another to create a dramatic piece of writing centered around the famous, "Please sir, I want some more!" scene from Oliver Twist.

In Maths, we having been looking at standard and non-standard units of measuring both capacity and volume, focussing on estimating and problem solving.

In Science, we have been looking at the reproductive parts of plants and how asexual reproduction takes place amongst certain plants and the importance of how this works.

In PSHE, we have been talking more about lifestyle choices, and what might happen our bodies if we do not maintain a balanced lifestyle – e.g. eating too much of less healthy foods, or not eating enough of the right foods and the impact it can have on our mental and physical health.

In DT, we are experimenting with the design elements of the doodlers we are making, and how the positioning of certain elements will affect their movement, and the children need to consider their own design choices for their future build.

What will your role be in our play 'Aladdin Trouble'?

There has been much excitement this week, as the parts in our end-of-year production have been announced and the children finally know who has which role. We have already begun work on learning some of the songs, which are being taught by Tom, our specialist Music Teacher, and the children are enjoying singing together. In History, we have been looking at a key moment in British life since 1945: the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II and the role that television had in allowing the public to witness this piece of History. This is all the more relevant, as we approach the coronation of King Charles III next weekend. In PSHE, we discussed using mobile phones safely and the children thought of some Tops Tips to ensure they are safe. The children have also been working very hard in preparation for SATs in just over a week's time and we are extremely proud of them.

We all know that gaming is a hugely popular activity for a number of different reasons, e.g. socialisation, coping mechanism, skill building and much more. Many games are not appropriate for children and plenty of parents struggle with this. Internet Matters have put a guide together which details some alternative games beyond the most popular ones and promoting gaming as a family affair. HOW TO SPOT FAKE NEWS

The news you see online or on social media isn't always going to be accurate. And it can be hard to tell what's real and what's fake.

Some websites will report fake news or things that aren't completely true. They might do it because they want to scare you or make you do something. Or because they make money from people going to their site.

Fake news can look real, but there are ways to help you spot it.

Check the source

Check the name of the website and its web address to see if it looks real. Some sites will try to look like other websites so you think they're genuine.

Look for evidence

Find out whether it's being reported on other sites that you know and trust. If it's only being reported on websites you've never heard of then it might not be true.

Don't decide straight away

Sometimes headlines or stories are designed to scare or interest you. Read what's in the article carefully, ask yourself whether it seems true and why they're saying it.

Ask someone you trust

Try asking an <u>adult you trust</u> to see what they think. If you're worried about something you've seen online, you can always talk to a <u>Childline counsellor</u>.
