
### A and B Team Netball vs Holy Trinity

## **Class Notes**

### How do you make a sandwich?

This week in Nursery we have been designing and making our own delicious sandwiches. The children have been using their developing mark making skills to make a list of all the ingredients that they would like to include in their sandwich. They have then been following instructions to make their own sandwiches, thinking very carefully about how to be safe with knives. We have also planted beans and cannot wait to see if they will grow.

### How many ways can you make 10?

This week the children in Reception have been starting to learn about Easter. We read the story of the Angel and the Dove by Sophie Piper. After a very sad day, a nesting Dove and an Angel rejoice in the miracles of spring and new life. The story gently touches on the events of the first Easter with a heartwarming message about new life which celebrates the Resurrection. The children used their phonic sounds to find spring related objects in and Eye Spy Collection; for example, 'I can see a rabbit.' We have made Easter Gardens and planted cress in them, which will hopefully be growing when they are taken home, next week. In maths we are continuing to review what we have learned this year, which has involved lots of addition and number bond activities using lots of fun resources such as hoops and beanbags, colourful beads and Numicon tiles.

### What shall we do about the dragon at our school?!

This week in Year 2 we had lots of visitors to the school! We started with an assembly from a poet, Matt Windle, who taught us some top tips for writing and performing poems, as well as some beatboxing tips. Not long after we had gone back to class, we got an unexpected phone call from Mrs Bell, who asked us for help. When investigating the hall, we found not one... not two... but three dragon eggs! We went and checked the CCTV and found that a dragon had been spotted around the school. The children spent the rest of the week in English writing up all about the exciting event, and next week we will be exploring how to catch/ tame this dragon.

In Maths, we finished our unit on measure by exploring centimetres and metres - for example, looking around the classroom to find what we might use centimetres or metres for when measuring them. In Science, we discussed what made our plant growing successful or unsuccessful, and how to tell if a plant is healthy or unhealthy. In Computing, we practised different ways of inserting pictures into our Google Slides all about China. In Geography, we compared the human features of China and the UK, looking at some famous buildings like Buckingham Palace and the Imperial Palace/ Forbidden City.

To end the week, we tested and evaluated some flavour combinations for our healthy wraps, and have chosen our 3 key ingredients we will be using to make them next week.



### **Class Notes**

### How will your chapter for Me, My Dad and the End of the Rainbow, end?

This week in Year 5, as a part of world poetry day, we had an epic visit from poet and boxer, Matt Windle – the children made a tremendous rap all about Henry VIII and the Tudors – what an incredible time was had!

In English, we have been building up to and planning writing a new chapter for the fantastic book we've been reading, 'Me, My Dad and the end of the rainbow'. We're imagining we are authors, and can continue the story ourselves. Each person in year 5 will have their very own individual and unique chapter, and they cannot wait to get writing next week. In Science, we've been continuing our work on understanding different types of friction and resistance, with fun experiments taking place too. Discuss also with your children what makes certain objects, like cars or boats, streamlined? In Maths, we've been comparing, ordering and rounding numbers to one decimal place, think about looking at receipts and discussing the decimal numbers you find!

### How did our class poem help you think about Fair Trade?

As part of World Poetry Day, we were fortunate to have a visit from Matt Windle, Birmingham's Poet Laureate. He helped each class to create a poem based on Fair Trade - this links to our Geography topic of World Trade. The children rehearsed and performed their class poem in a special assembly, and they thoroughly enjoyed showing the other year groups what they had created. It was a great unifying moment for the children too. Fair Trade is the subject of our latest Star Writing too, which involves an explanation text and formal writing. The children are also using Passive Voice and Relative Clauses in this text. In Maths, we have been looking at Ratio, Proportion and Scale Drawings. Some of the children questioned the need for this as Google Maps helps us significantly. We were able to introduce them to the Duke of Edinburgh Scheme for when they are older, when the expedition does not allow for any mobile device and the ability to read a map is crucial! They may also encounter these skills in Scouts, Guides, Boys and Girls' Brigade. Of course, being in places where there is no signal ,renders such devices useless, so this is an important life skill!

### **Supporting Children's Safety**

### Talking to your child about social media

The internet offers huge opportunities. From a young age, children have the chance to learn, research, play games, have fun and connect with family who may not live nearby. But it's important to help them to use the online world in a way that's safe and positive for their mental health.

That's why it's good to have regular conversations about the internet and social media from a young age – it should be as ordinary as talking about the weather, the dog, or something you've watched on TV.

You don't need to pry or quiz your child about every website they've seen, but checking in with them for a minute or two can make a huge difference.

Take a look at our tips below for having positive conversations with your child about social media. Lead by example

Talk to your child about your own experience of the online world. Show them sites and apps that you like, and explain why you like them. Show them how to use the internet in a positive way – to research things, to do homework, to talk to family, and to find out about the world. This helps them to have a critical eye.

You can also talk about your own less positive experiences online. If you feel pressured by the 'perfect' photos people share on social media, then being open with your child about this can be a good thing. It might help them understand that the 'perfect' pictures people share on social media don't always show reality. Encourage them to talk to you if they're struggling with this.

Remember, children look to their parents as role models. For example, if you check your phone constantly at mealtimes, or play violent games in front of your children, then it's likely your child might do the same.

### Talk to your child about your own experience of the online world.

Ask your child about the apps and websites they use

It can be easy to feel that you don't understand the latest technology, apps or social media that your child is using. But don't use this as an excuse not to get involved.

Ask your child to teach you and show you there about their favourite apps, games or websites. This will help you understand how they work so that you can talk about the positives and whether you have any concerns. A quick Google search can also tell you a lot.

If you think anything your child is accessing is not appropriate for their age, be ready to explain why you think this. Wherever possible, make it a joint decision with your child, so they understand the reasons not to use something and will stick to it. Ask your child to teach you about their favourite apps, games or websites.


