## **Enquiry Question of the week**

## What represents Australian culture?

Australia has a rich and unique culture.

- <u>Unique Animals:</u> Australia is home to many animals that are not found anywhere else in the world. Kangaroos, koalas, and platypuses are some examples. Learning about these fascinating creatures can be both fun and educational.
- <u>Aboriginal Culture:</u> The indigenous people of Australia are called Aboriginals. They have a rich cultural history that includes traditional art, music, and Dreamtime stories. Dreamtime stories often involve animals and explain how the world was created.
- <u>Unique Vocabulary:</u> Australians have some unique words and phrases that might sound funny to someone not from there. For example, they might call their friends "mates," and instead of saying "barbecue," they often say "barbie."
- National Symbols: The national symbols of Australia include the kangaroo and the emu, which are featured on the Australian coat of arms. The flag has the Southern Cross constellation, which is visible in the southern hemisphere.
- Celebrations and Festivals: Australians celebrate events like Australia Day on January 26th. Australians commemorate Anzac Day on 25 April every year. Anzac Day draws large crowds of people to the dawn services, and marches are held around the country.
